




Introduction

The National Youth Service Action and Social Development Research Institute (NYSASDRI) is a non-profit social development organisation that reaches about 5.2 million populations in Orissa with its innovative and sustainable development strategy. Established as a village youth club, the organisation has pioneered several development initiatives since 1973.

What sets this organization apart is its commitment to giving power to the people: the programmes of this organization are all focused on facilitating the people's equal access to and control over their own resources, so that they may work towards a better quality of life. By combining direct



service delivery with research, advocacy, and networking, 140 highly skilled professionals have provided exemplary healthcare, education, rehabilitation, women empowerment, livelihood promotion and legal services to those who need it most. Its initiatives has not only improved the quality of life of people which it serves, but also has impacted the development policy of the government.

NYSASDRI is registered under the Indian Society Registration Act, XXI of 1860 (Registration No. DKL/390/80), the Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA) of 1976 (Registration. No. 104890005) and 12 (A) & 80 (G) of the Income Tax Act.



Community Empowerment & Advocacy For Sustainable Health Care for People in Extrem need in Odisha (CEASH)

- Management of two Primary Health Centre(n) through Public Private partnership models, pioneer in Odisha

HEALTH

Public Private Partnership in Rural Health Care

Primary Health Centres in central Orissa have long been defunct due to Government and community neglect: NYSASDRI initiative is one of the important most recent developments primary healthcare in this area. For the first time, two Primary Health Centres (PHCs) in the Atta village of Jajpur and Khankira village of Dhenkanal were **NYSASDRI** transferred to management using the Public



Private Partnership (PPP) model. NYSASDRI's work has restored function to the PHCs and delivered vital healthcare to the people in the PHCs' operational areas.

With the help of NYSASDRI's organizational and financial support, these PHCs have introduced 24 x 7hour institutional delivery facilities, ambulances, electricity, instruments and equipment, phone service, and beautification efforts such as wall paintings ,plantation and flower gardens into their facilities. The wall paintings serve the additional purpose of giving clear-cut visual information to the public about healthcare delivery in their area. Recent achievements include the introduction of referral services for the needy, increased numbers of institutional deliveries, and eye screening camps held at both PHCs, and a one-day reproductive health clinic for expectant mothers. An orientation on PHC management was also given to the staff of the PHCs to promote more effective management of health care. A Mega Health Camp was organized at Khankira PHC (N); though reaching maximum

A Mega Health Camp was organized at Khankira PHC (N); though reaching maximum numbers of patients in such a hard-to-reach area such as Khankira proved difficult, with the help of NYSASDRI the PHCs were able to convince the district authorities to hold the camp and deliver healthcare to patients who truly needed it. The CEASH team provided vital logistical and emotional support to the camp for 3 days. Tribal villages in the peripheral areas, far from big cities, could seize an opportunity to have modern healthcare at their doorstep.







The Reproductive Child Health Camp (2009) at Khankira PHC (N) provided a variety of healthcare facilities to those living in inaccessible areas. 93 additional outreach camps, regular outreach services, and 24-hour service provided through the PHCs has resulted in a substantial increase in patients over the past 5 years. The Khankira PHC has also installed one doctor's room, one dispensing room, one 5-bed ward, one labor room, and a latrine to add to its facilities.



The success of this pioneering initiative persuaded the National Rural Health Mission to support 19 NGOs to manage 22 PHCs all over Orissa. These partnerships deliver immunization services, counselling for pregnant women, awareness about malaria, and family planning services including

healthcare and work against cultural taboos of such activities.

NYSASDRI has gained governmental support for the centres to enable them to serve the community for the long-term. The Government of Orissa Health and Family Welfare organization supports NYSASDRI in continuing management of the centres.

This means the people now have open lines of communication with their governmental representatives through the PPP/PHC model and can control their access to healthcare, through NYSASDRI's efforts.

Community Empowerment and Advocacy for Sustainable Healthcare (CEASH)

NYSASDRI realized that defunct PHCs meant not only that poor people were barred from access to care, but also that poor people were barred from having a voice in government regarding their healthcare delivery. The Community Empowerment and Advocacy for Sustainable Healthcare (CEASH) program grants a voice to the people in government advocacy for healthcare. Operating in the Gondia area of Dhenkanal and the Sukinda area of Jajpur from 2004 to 2009, this program has six major components:

- 1. Empowerment of the poorest people in these areas, especially women, scheduled castes, and scheduled tribes, to improve their health and socio economic status.
- 2. Increased effectiveness of PRI in ensuring the provision of quality healthcare services to those in most need.
- 3. Effective delivery of high quality health services through two Primary Health Centres (PHCs)
- 4. Increased Knowledge about primary health care delivery in Orissa
- 5. Support among public, health professionals and government for health sector reform
- Increased capacity of civil society organizations, particularly NYSASDRI



After 5 years of the CEASH program's implementation, the impact seen in the community remains great: self-help groups now put the planning of health solutions into the hands of the community. 150 women's groups, 130 men's groups, 81 adolescent groups, and 66 emergency obstetric contingency (renamed to Village health committee) committees were formed and effected measurable change in their neighbourhoods.

These groups disseminated knowledge about Health, Sanitation, Income Generation methods, and available



government assistance programs and laws into their community, as well as raising awareness about the issues through creative means such as the 24 Palla and 20 Daskathia cultural performances organized in various villages.

CEASH Action on HIV/AIDS

In 2008, the Adolescent and SHGs members held an HIV/AIDS rally at Hatibari, partnering with the Jagruiti Kishori Club of Kaitha. The local UP school and other SHGs also participated by displaying posters and banners, performing streetplays, and holding public meetings and private counselling sessions. This resulted in the following:

- 22 members aware on HIV/AIDS
- 21 members aware on RTI/STI
- 12 individuals visiting the PHC (N) Khankira for treatment of STI

In addition, an HIV+ family in the Hatibari village was previously socially ostracized but has now been integrated back into good social standing. This is due to the efforts of the SHGs to educate the community about HIV/AIDS and about acceptance of those with HIV/AIDS. The case is being followed up regularly and the SHG members have also pressured the Panchayat and Block Administration to support the affected family.

CEASH Adolescent Health and Well-Being

Adolescents have become a powerful voice in rural Orissa society thanks to the CEASH program. They are spreading the message to young girls on physical health topics such as menstrual hygiene, STI, and HIV/AIDS. They are also educating their peers about the negative effects of early marriage. Their

efforts produced the following uplifting and positive effects in the community:

- 85 members of Khankira SHGs are sensitized about early marriage
- 1 member of Kishori club was married at age 18
- 4 early marriages were halted in villages



MOBILE MEDICAL UNIT (MMU)

Due to heavy pollution and degradation forest the innocent tribal community suffer a lot Defeating the transportation barrier to patient care, a Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) provides preventative and curative care as well as educational materials to 38 villages in the Jajpur area. In these remote villages far from adequate medicine and health equipment, mining and industries contribute to water and air pollution which leads to water-borne diseases and respiratory tract infections.



This MMU consists of one doctor, one pharmacist, one handyman and one driver. The unit performs a variety of health care related activities, such as providing immunizations, stressing maternity child health, performing neo natal, pre natal, post-natal checkups, treating RTI/STD, providing adolescent care and lifestyle education, counselling, treating minor ailments and anemia, treating common childhood illnesses such as diarrhea and complications resulting from measles. Over 6000 patients were given regular health checkups and referral services provided to patients for their need based treatment. as well as workshops on safe drinking water, breast feeding, HIV/AIDS, malaria, and swine flu.



KALINGA EYE HOSPITAL AND RESEARCH CENTRE

NYSASDRI's efforts in eye care services have resulted in a functional and methodical system of eye care delivery in central Orissa. The Kalinga Eye Hospital & Research Centre (KEHRC) is a unit of NYSASDRI established in 2002. KEHRC is a comprehensive eye hospital that is committed to changing the current state of eye care in the underserved region of central Orissa. KEHRC provides a wide range of services, from basic visual assessments to ophthalmic



surgery, geared towards serving all members of the community. Currently, there are two service streams: free and paid. Free services are made available to below poverty line (BPL) patients through donations from International NGOs, such as Unite for Sight, World Diabetes Foundation, ORBIS International and DIK. Paid services are provided to individuals with sufficient funds to cover the cost of their own eye care and are scaled according to



monthly income. Both streams have access to the same high standard of care, techniques and technology.

To reach its goals in providing eye care for rural villages around Orissa, KEHRC conducts community outreach camps that provide preventative eye care to individuals living in rural areas and to identify candidates for cataract surgery. These candidates are then transported to the base hospital for sight-restoring surgery, easing patient worries that they are not strong enough or wealthy

enough to travel to medical care. KEHRC has developed innovative methods to lower the costs of treatment to provide the most affordable care to its patients. NYSASDRI staff also trains schoolteachers and Angawadi workers to screen schoolchildren for eye problems and educate their communities that care is available for these eye problems.

In this last few years, KEHRC has completed approximately 31,400 surgeries, screened

more than 600,000 outpatients, distributed 1600 pairs of glasses, trained 915 school teachers, 1861 Anganwadi Workers and trained 100 doctors in the past six years. The hospital is registered under the Clinical Registration Act of Orissa and has received the District Award of Dhenkanal for three consecutive years. KEHRC is also a member of VISION 2020, a national organization dedicated to improving eye health in India, and has been supported by the World Health Organization.



REHABILITATION AND SUPPORT GROUPS

NYSASDRI maintains a commitment to rehabilitating and re-housing people who are displaced from society due to societal taboos, cultural stigmas, atrocious crimes, natural disasters, and other threatening life circumstances.

NYSASDRI joined forces with German and UK universities to research ways to give community support to those with autism and those with disabilities. For the first time in india, NYSASDRI introduced the concept of Circle of Support for Autism and Disabilities. It also promoted the concept of support network for Autism and Disabilities through various media and workshop. An international conference was also held to



bring together ideas of grassroots NGOs, professionals, government departments, and social activists; these groups formed a state wide network of Disability Service Organizations to

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work for the empowerment and welfare of people with disabilities.

Diversifying its support for people with disabilities, NYSASDRI also implemented the Community-Based Rehabilitation for Persons with Disability program (CBRPD). Operating in the Gondia block of Dhenkanal, this program provides counseling, self-help groups, rehabilitation services, and government support to

disabled people. Capacity-building training is conducted for teachers, social and health workers. Anganwadi workers, community organizations to increase community awareness about the support services available for disabled people. Going farther than the already needed preventative. curative, referral, and rehabilitation aspects of care, this organization also aims to promote full social and economic inclusion of people with disabilities into the society. By providing training on healthcare, inclusive education, daily living skills, and incomegenerating activities, this program helps people with disabilities gain independence and financial benefits such as building their own savings or credit resources.



WOMEN AND CHILDREN'S SERVICES

NYSASDRI balances quality services for needy women and children with a variety of programs that empower women to take back control of their lives. The Santhasara-based Counseling Center in Dhenkanal provides crisis intervention and counseling services to women and families who have survived atrocious crime and sexual assault. Referrals, home visits, reconciliation services are provided



when needed, as well as village awareness meetings to establish community support for



these individuals. Follow-up reports show that in the past 5 years, 322 cases have been closed and many women have moved into safer living situations with their families.

The Short Stay Home has been running for 15 years, providing shelter to distressed women and girls until they can find a healthy living alternative to the abusive homes they left behind. Many of the women remarry, move in with family, or find employment after receiving counselling, legal support, health checks, literacy classes, and basic necessities from the Short

Stay Home. The women also receive job training in tailoring, broom making, nursery, cooking, and gardening, and they also form self-help groups that help them earn and save money. The Home also provides extensive legal assistance, registering cases with the police department and sometimes taking the cases to court. NYSASDRI has recently added

a building to the facility, enabling more women to use the program.

The Deemed Orphan Program is also housed at the Short Stay Home, providing support to orphaned, abandoned, and surrendered children.14 children currently receive food, lodging, healthcare, education, and pocket money, among other services.



EDUCATION

SCHOOL-AGE EDUCATION AND TRIBAL EDUCATION

This organization also has a widespread and proud tradition of quality education in rural areas. It introduced the joyful education methods with active community participation. Educational centres are established in villages, headed Village Education bν Committees to oversee the centre's activities. These centres provided an opportunity to 218 children to read, write, and speak in Oriya and 67 of these children passed out to join higher studies from 2003 to 2005.

NYSASDRI has established an educational complex specifically for tribal girls providing education to over 600 students with from Standard 1 to 5. Over the past 5 years, more than 100 girls have passed out from this school and joined higher study. These students received a chance to be independent and contributing members of society, by performing cleaning and gardening for their school, celebrating local festivals, and learning at a level equal to mainstream society. They also received food, clothing,





boarding, health checks, incentives, pocket money and medicine for free. The students have become ambassadors of development, advocating education among tribals.



ODM COMMUNITY SCHOOL

The ODM Community School (Orissa Demonstrative Multipurpose Community School) in Gondia exemplifies NYSASDRI's ambitious goals for quality childhood education. This school brings primary education to rural areas, in an English-Medium and child-friendly environment that will propel children into the constantly evolving society. Total 72 students between ages 3-6 are currently enrolled in a Central Board of Secondary



Education pattern, and the school has eventual goals to teach students up to class 10 and add a library, boarding facilities, computers, and a scholarship program to the school's



assets. Parent-teacher meetings are organized quarterly to give parents the chance to discuss their children's progress and to have a voice in their children's education, through suggestions to the school. This delivers empowerment regarding education to entire families. The ODM Community School is not only about learning, but it is also about developing an interest in one's cultural environment and for that special days like the National Day,

Rakshya Bandhan Day, Sapling Plantation Day, Hand Washing Day, Annual Functions etc




CRÈCHE CENTRES

Through NYSASDRI 26 Creche centers are developed in Dhenkanal and Keonjhar district of Odisha to provide daycare services to 650 children under the age of 3-5. Generally these children come from the lower income families, scheduled castes and tribes, and families with below poverty line and disabled members. The centers also provide support to mothers, providing play materials, nutritious



food, health checks, medicines, and teaching materials for the families. This significantly reduces the burden of being a working mother in these impoverished communities.



SOCIAL JUSTICE

SWADHIKAR FORUM: Promoting Violence-Free Lives for Poor and Marginalized Women

This project, supported by Oxfam India, aims to build a strong community voice to challenge discrimination and violence against women of social and religious minority groups. Currently running on an experimental basis in Sadar and Gondia blocks of Dhenkanal, this program directs survivors of abuse towards institutional services and strengthens existing services. 13 NGOs and 5 supporting institutions provide social, financial, and legal support to women in the Swadhikar Forum shelters. Workshops were also held to discuss the question of what constitutes gender violence at all, opening a dialogue in the community for such topics. More than 1000 people received information about legal services available to them, and three victims of domestic violence were helped by NYSASDRI to start a rice paddy business, allowing them to provide for themselves.

Women Empowerment and Equal Rights

NYSASDRI organized a 2007 workshop on Gender Equality in the Workplace, where gender policy of NGOs was discussed using case studies and lecture methods. Amount of leave time, accommodations, recruitment, facilities, benefits, and behavior towards men and women in the workplace should be equal, and this workshop opened discussion for how to incorporate this into workplaces. A 2006 Jajpur Conference was held for members of women's Self-Help Groups to exchange ideas. 482 attendees discussed group endeavors, leadership, healthcare awareness, legal and



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social rights, and advocacy plans for the poor and needy women. These women also improved their own public speaking skills and received emotional support and inspiration from each other. In the Gondia and Sukinda areas, over 300 women and supporting NGOs rallied to protest gender discrimination, equal rights, eradication of domestic violence, abolishing the dowry system, and other topics during an International Women's Day celebration.

Through the CEASH Program (see CEASH section above), a wide variety of Self-Help Groups for

women were formed so that women can access the resources in their community and they can advocate for themselves to create more resources, helping them control their own livelihood.

In 2008, Lokamela was held to empower tribal women to protect and share their culture with those around them. Held at Kashipur Resource Centre, the program had government officials deliberate on current governmental and NGO schemes in place for socio-economic empowerment of women. Women's Self-Help Groups were also heavily involved in the Lokamela, evolving a strategy for continuation of women empowerment activities even after the project end date.



Community Involvement in Social Justice

NYSASDRI is involved in a variety of social justice endeavors. The organization recently provided training for Accredited Social Health Activists, sharing experiences of primary healthcare delivery and using audiovisual aids and cultural references to increase retention of information. In 2008, a Capacity Building Training Program was held as a forum among village leaders and community representatives with the goal of





devising new strategies to reduce hunger. The roles of village level committees and volunteers in this process were also critically examined. NYSASDRI has also been involved in the Panchayat Raj Election process, ensuring that applicants with a criminal background were promptly rejected and organizing the whole process.

In 2005, a Lokpal meeting was held in Bhubaneswar to increase awareness among consumers, NGOs, and legal practitioners about state issues.

Workshops on the Right to Information Act were held in 2008 and 2010 in Gondia block, informing 200 participants about the procedures and effectiveness of the Act, as well as the importance of transparency and accountability in preventing a corrupt society. The Padayatra meeting was held to inform youth about justice, rights, participation, protection, change, and development in policy. This meeting was run by 253 representatives of 23 different women's SHGs. And to inform the public about issues facing our elder generation, World Elders Day was celebrated in 2005, during which State officials appealed to the young generation to care for the older community. More than 200 senior citizens and 100 school children participated.



FIGHTING FOR LAND RIGHTS

A 2007 Forum on Land Rights was held in Bhubaneswar, and 83 representatives from the media, academic disciplines, activist organizations, and government committees have participated to give a focused on the goal of reviewing Orissa land policy. As a result of this forum, the Government of Orissa has





initiated measures to increase productivity of agriculture, as well as leasing more homestead lands to the poor and landless families. NYSASDRI is also planning to work with several NGOs to support the government program My Home, My Homestead, which will organize meetings to solve problems regarding the land of the people.






NATURAL RESOURCES: RESTORATION AND SUSTAINABILITY

NYSASDRI uses environmentally-friendly programs to help needy families participate in income-generating activities, using micro credit, sustainable and new agriculture methods, and culturally supported ways to best use Orissa's natural resources.

Turning wastelands into hope

NYSASDRI maintains a commitment to using available resources, and the organization thinks quite creatively when determining what materials constitute useable resources. A barren wasteland in

Raising Awareness of Sustainable Methods

NYSASDRI supports village education programs to teach community members about taking care of their environment. A workshop was on Solid Waste Management was organized in 2006 at Kashipur where 90 people from women's organizations, self-help groups, youth, and teachers have participated. Similarly in April 2010 another workshop on Climate Change was organized at Kashipur field centre of NYSASDRI where 76 people, including government officials

This workshop has given knowledge on effects of climate change, and its prevention. The participants have also pledged to plant trees and form a Forest Protection Program in their community. Demonstrations of sustainable agricultural models are also held in villages. 40 vermin compost pits were installed in 15 villages, which now use organic compost such as cow dung and bio-pesticides in their agricultural activities. NYSASDRI continues to learn and grow as an organization, and spent time learning about Sili Culture activities so that future projects can teach these activities to villages. Sili-culture is a soil-less cultivation system which is adopted to low productive lands or even to unproductive surfaces (roofs, rocky or sloppy areas). It consumes less water and minimal labor force than traditional agriculture, which makes it cost effective and can be adopted

own lives while helping the environment. The Santhasara village has already used these strategies to cultivate 5 chili plots in 2008.

Sustainable Food Security through Agricultural

Creating awareness is a worthy goal in itself, but NYSASDRI programs always aim for the long-term success



of a region through activities originated and continued by the local villagers. A program on Sustainable Development Through Food Security for Tribal Families of Gondia Block was formed. Awareness was raised in 15 villages and 550 tribal families regarding better management of water resources, and a canal, sluice gate, and 4 water harvesting structures were constructed for helping 255 farmers to irrigate 226 acres of previously inaccessible land. Two grain stores were constructed, and crop yield significantly increased for



farmers since the introduction of compost and bio fertilizers. Self-help groups, parent-teacher associations, water-user associations, and community centres have been set up so the public plays an active role in the sustainability of this program.



ADVOCACY, RESEARCH, AND DOCUMENTATION

NYSASDRI as a National and International Partner

NYSASDRI maintains a commitment to working with national and international organizations, both to receive outside input to improve programs and to assist other organizations with the same mission, to deliver quality resources for the world's poorest people. The All-Orissa NGO Conference brought together 19 NGOs to discuss effectiveness of current programs, recommendations for the future, and forming an NGO network to better the lives of the people in the entire state. The International Conferences on Circle of Support in 2005 and 2006 brought in international experts from Dortmund University of Applied Sciences in Germany to work with project partners to evaluate support delivery for people with disabilities. NYSASDRI represented the state of Orissa well at the UN Conference of the Department of Public Information in 2005, where 2000+ attendees from 1200 NGOs from 120 countries brought together ideas under the theme, "Our Challenge: Voices for Peace, Partnerships, and Renewal." And Mr. Sarangadhar Samal, NYSASDRI founder and director, travelled to USA and Germany to present a paper on "Public Private Partnerships in Indian Context" to listeners at the Unite for Sight International Conference in 2007. The BASAID Program brought representatives from Switzerland to Kalinga Eye Hospital to learn about the hospital's treatment efforts for those with both cataract and leprosy. They also visited other NYSASDRI healthcare sites, including a construction site for a new labor and delivery nursing facility.

NYSASDRI is proud to host national and international volunteers at its program sites. This past year, the Vivekananda Institute of Social Work and Social Science (VISWASS) provided student interns to NYSASDRI's Student Internship Program. The students were involved in field and office activities at NYSASDRI, gaining exposure that would develop them into effective working professionals.

The goal of International Volunteering in NYSASDRI is to make the living conditions of Orissa's rural poor and backward communities better by exchanging international experiences, knowledge, and skills with those from Indian organizations. France's Passworld, America's Unite for Sight, and Germany's Agro Action send volunteers to NYSASDRI schools and Kalinga Eye Hospital to perform direct and indirect service. Volunteers introduce cutting edge teaching techniques and materials into the schools, as well as teach English and perform other services such as decorating the school with wall paintings and support services for eye care activities Volunteers also serve as NYSASDRI ambassadors to their home country, creating documents and web pages to spread the organization's message and facilitate resource mobilization. Volunteers have improved the water and sanitation infrastructure of the region, trained school teachers, set up a 2010 Master Plan for the next 10 years, raised funds, and constructed latrines and solar panels. NYSASDRI also provides a friendly environment, food, training, and accommodations for the volunteers, creating a unique Indian cultural experience for them.

Internal Improvements

In the year 2008, NYSASDRI honoured Ms. Sabita Samal (Superintendent of the Short Stay Home), demonstrating the organization's commitment to honouring those individuals who bring NYSASDRI work to a higher level. The 2005 Annual Advisory Council brought together staff, legal advisors, volunteers, and governing body representatives to contribute their opinions about NYSASDRI's current program delivery efficiency and to make suggestions regarding future actions.
