Volunteering at Kalinga Eye Hospital

From April-June, 6 volunteers traveled to Dhenkanal to work with Kalinga Eye Hospital through the organization Unite for Sight. Volunteer projects this quarter have included research studies investigating patient eye drop usage and analyzing the economic profile of cataract surgery patients, improve-

ment of the hospital's website, computerizing data from village eye screenings, and investigating options for a switchover to an electronic medical records system. In addition to working on these projects, volunteers also participate in village eye camps and observe and record cataract surgeries.

The following people volunteered at Kalinga Eye Hospital during the months of April, May, and June: Alim Faridali Ramji, Rhonda M. Chinchilla, Kate McConnel, Sruthi Sakamuri, Bonnie Schmemzle, and Morgan Graves.

84 people affected with Diabetes were treated with Laser Photocoagulation procedure, preserving their sight.

Eradicating Childhood Blindness: Monnet Power Company Ltd.

The status of paediatric eye care is poorer than adult eye care in Orissa. Considering the current situation of paediatric eye care, Monnet Power Limited, a corporate house based in Angul, partnered with Kalinga Eye

Hospital to organize two paediatric eye screening camps. On April 28th in Nisha and on May 12th in Malikamani, 207 children were screened by technicians form Kalinga Eye Hospital Vision Centre in Angul. 46

children were provided with medication, and 19 received glasses, all free of charge. These outreaches were the second phase of an initiative begun in January to organize eye screenings targeting children.



Lighting Two Other Lives

On May 14th, Kalinga Eve Hospital retrieved a pair of corneas from the third patient in Dhenkanal to donate corneas after death. The donor, Nabaghana Sahoo, Chairman of Hindol Block of Dhenkanal, died in a

road accident. Permission to collect the corneas was given by the donor's brother, Muralidhar Sahoo. The procedure was done at the District Headquarter Hospital in Dhenkanal with participation by Kalinga Eye

Hospital's technical staff. This was the third incident of cornea collection in Dhenkanal, after donations in January and March of 2011.

ORBIS Evaluates 5 Years at Kalinga Eye Hospital

In June 2011, ORBIS published an evaluation of Kalinga Eve Hospital's progress over the past five years. The 23-page report, entitled "Developing Institutional Capacity of Kalinga Eye Hospital and Research Centre," includes findings from a 7day internal evaluation of the project launched in 2006 to increase the hospital's institutional capacity to deliver quality eve care to the people of central Orissa. The report also includes a three-year plan for continuing this project in the future. The evaluating team was led by ORBIS Asia Senior Advisor Abu Raihain, and other ORBIS leaders involved in the report were Larry Benjamin, Lene Overland, Samson Cheung, Lutful Husain, Golden Frankly, and Kate

Collins.

ORBIS reported that Kalinga Eve Hospital has achieved "tremendous progress" over the past 5 years, especially in the areas of increasing adult cataract surgeries, establishing a paediatric service, and expanding its reach to new districts. The hospital met all but one of its original targets for the 5-year period, and it exceeded several. The Paediatric Centre, which opened on 5th March 2009, is very well-equipped and exceeds standards for secondarylevel hospitals. Additionally, outreach screening numbers have been successfully boosted by collaboration with Mission Netrotsav, a government program with links to local schools. This has led to a dramatic increase in the number of children being screened for

eye diseases.

In addition to increasing its services and scope. Kalinga Eye Hospital continues to provide patients with high-quality care, as well as maintaining an organizational culture of excellence. A patient satisfaction survey showed that most were pleased with both their care and the explanations they received about their disease and proper treatment. They also expressed satisfaction with the general cleanliness and facilities, and 80% said they would strongly recommend this hospital to friends and relatives. Furthermore, the staff also reported high levels of satisfaction; they reported that they are well-equipped to carry out their activities, they are treated with respect by supervisors, and the hospital

has a friendly working environment.

The report praised Kalinga Eve Hospital's recent expansion Eye Hospital's recent expansion into more underserved areas. highlighting the three Vision Centres established in 2010 in Angul, Athgarh, and Bhuban. After visiting the centre in Angul, the evaluation team reported that it was well-stocked with medical equipment and a vast collection of spectacles. Overall, the evaluation reports strong progress over the past five years at Kalinga Eye Hospital. The report concludes. "The current strengths of KEH are its high tech medical equipment, its high volume adult cataract service delivery and an extended outreach program; this is an incredible development."
