Restoring Sights: Unite For Sight

Unite For Sight, a nonprofit global health delivery organization that empowers communities worldwide to improve eye health and eliminate preventable blindness has joined forces with Kalinga Eye Hospital, Dhenkanal to provide comprehensive Ophthalmic care including examinations by eye doctors, diagnosis and care for all treatable conditions, educating the community about preventive measures through conducting Outreach eye treatment camps. Outreach camp services are conducted in a radius of about seven hours from the clinic in the local villages to minimize the patient travelling. These pa-

tients are provided with follow up care by our outreach teams regularly. To date, more than 20,000 people, including 2051 adult & 9 Paediatric cases got sight restored in this year under this joint program and in the last quarter 614 adult and one paediatric cases were restored with sight.

92 people affected with Diabetes were treated with Laser Photocoagulation procedure, preserving their sight.

Relighting life; Deogarh

The people of Deogarh were afraid of undergoing cataract surgery after an unfortunate cataract operation. Kalinga Eye Hospital has since restored their confidence in cataract surgeries and has joined hand with the district administration

of Deogarh to organize eye treatment camps followed by cataract eye surgeries in the district of Deogarh. In the initial phases, Kalinga Eye Hospital's technical team were conducting camps in the different blocks of Deogarh and holding

the surgeries in the District Head quarter Hospital of Deogarh. In order to maintain quality & sterility in the surgeries, Kalinga Eye Hospital has conducted four outreach camps between September 14-17, 2011 and restored 190 sights.

Eye Screening Camp for Drivers.

A eye screening camp was organized in Dhenkanal town for Driver trainees of all the Dhenkanal driving training institutes in order to improve road safety, especially in the NH55, connecting NH5 to NH6. The camp was organized by the Dhenkanal Road trans-

port Office in presence of Dr. BishnuCharan-Behera, the Chief District Medical Officer, Dhenkanal. 177 Driver Trainees were examined by Kalinga Eye hospital, Dhenkanal Ophthalmologists for Eye ailments, the results of which were: 1 patient was diagnosed

with cataract related blindness, 27 were diagnosed with refractive error and were prescribed glasses and a further 79 were given prescription medications. This program was highly successful and will help to keep safer roads in the near future.



Strengthening Paediatric Eye Care Services

In order to further strengthen the Paediatric Eye Care unit at Kalinga Eye Hospital, Dhenkanal, a meeting was organized at OR-BIS International, India country office on 14th July 2011, in presence of Mr. Paul Forrest, Regional Director-ORBIS-ASIA, Dr. Abu Raihan. Consultant-ORBIS-ASIA, Dr. Rishi

Raj Borah, Senior Program Manager, ORBIS India country office, Mr. Golden Frankly, Program Manager, ORBIS India country office, while Maj. Gen S. D .Mahanti, Chief Advisor, Mr. Sarangadhar-Samal, Director and Sunil Kumar Mishra. Hospital Manager represented Kalinga Eye Hospital. This day-long

review and planning meeting has revealed few more opportunities for developing the Paediatric Eye Care services in Orissa as the Kalinga Eye Hospital and ORBIS International have agreed to extend their support to the future Paediatric Ophthalmic related activities.

Employee Eye Screening Camp: UAL

On 28th September 2011, a Health check up camp was organized at Utkal Asbestos Limited (UAL), Dhenkanal by Employees State Insurance (ESI), Orissa, where Technical team for Ophthalmic treatment

was provided by Kalinga Eye Hospital, Dhenkanal. 181 people were screened for ophthalmic problems and 6 were identified with cataract, 58 were identified with refractive error and 47 were diagnosed with other infec-

tious ophthalmic diseases. Medical supplies were provided to the identified patients and all the expenses were born by the Utkal Asbestos Limited ,Dhenkanal

A New Life: Case Story

Tikili, is well aware of the role that females frequently play in society and, as one of two daughters, felt as if she was a burden to her father. However, realizing that her family's financial situation was desperate, she decided on becoming a teacher, which would provide income to her family and help lift them out of poverty. She worked hard as a student at the Kodala Primary School and excelled in both academics and sports. but began to realize that her poor vision was impeding her success. Tikili was struggling with her studies as she could barely read the blackboard. Despite her poor vision, Tikili continued to attend school, relying on the help of teachers to learn and complete assignments. Eventually, however, Tikili's vision became too poor to see anything at all Fortunately, a clinic sponsored by Kalinga Eye Hospital was held in Tikili's village in June 2011, where she was diagnosed by Dr. Garnayak with bi-lateral

cataracts and referred to the base hospital for cataract-removal surgery. Dr. Arun Kumar Samal, conducted the surgery on her left eye, improving her vision from PL+ve, PR+ve to 6/60 on her first follow up. Currently, Tikili is waiting for surgery on her other eye. She continues to work hard in school to achieve her goals of becoming a teacher.
